

A Letter from the Vicar - One step at a time...

By the time you read this we will be celebrating the great Christian festival of Easter. Our alleluias will be filling the church, not just on Easter Day, but for 50 days afterwards when we arrive at the feast of Pentecost. Although it is no more important than the other 9 principal Holy Days in the Church calendar, Easter feels particularly special, as Spring erupts in all it's glory and the promise of new life can be seen all around. It is as if all creation joins our celebrations. Our very familiarity with the resurrection, and the knowledge that it will follow the crucifixion, sometimes blinds us to the reality of the first Easter, when disbelief, confusion and joy kept close company.



Despite Jesus' careful teaching and preparation, the disciples weren't expecting him to rise from the dead. Instead of unfettered joy, the first Easter was a series of stumbling steps and joyous discovery.

Mark's Gospel ends with the disciples fleeing in terror when they find the tomb empty. Seeing him through her tears, Mary Magdelene mistakes the risen Jesus for the gardener before she recognises his voice. She joyously runs to tell the disciples, only to find they don't believe her. Thomas wasn't present when Jesus

appeared to the disciples the first Easter evening, and refused to believe that Jesus was alive until he saw Jesus for himself a week later. Despite a lengthy Bible study on the road to Emmaus, it isn't until Jesus breaks bread that Cleopas and his companion recognise Jesus. Step by step, the disciples began to understand and rejoice in the resurrection and continue to discover what it meant for them, one step at a time, through the rest of the New Testament. We are an Easter People, and Alleluia is our song. It is right that we celebrate the resurrection with all the joy and energy we can muster. We are also disciples of Jesus. What the resurrection means, even as we sing our Alleluias, will only make sense as we walk with Jesus' first disciples one step at a time; walking in the company of Jesus through the rest of our lives.

Confirmation

A Confirmation Service with Bishop Sam will take place at 11.00 am on Sunday 2 June (Trinity Sunday). I am aware of a small group of young adults wishing to be Confirmed. If you have not been Confirmed and would like to think more about the possibility of joining them, please contact Rev Anne. (countryvicar@outlook.com or 01270 628864) A 6 week course looking at the Christian faith will be held after Easter, for anyone interested in Confirmation or in refreshing their understanding of the Christian faith. If you have already been Confirmed but have recently come back to faith it is possible to renew your Baptism Vows as a way of publicly re-affirming your commitment to Christ. Adults who have not been Baptised and would like be are normally baptised and Confirmed at the same service. Participating in the course does not commit you to being Confirmed, although you will need to do the course if you wish to be Confirmed, Baptised or renew your Baptism Vows.

Canal & River Trust's 1st Concept Workboat & Hopper named at Aqueduct Marina



This first boat of a new concept design has been named Bass during its recent launch at Aqueduct Marina, where the boat was built. Named after David Bass, a Senior Project Delivery Manager at the Trust who, along with British Waterways, David has worked for the past 27 years. The boat was named in recognition of all of David's years of hard work and effort he has put into the concept and its unique design. He has been a leading force in developing and building this first boat, using laser-cut components in the build of its hull and CNC-cut components for the cabin interior, all of which have reduced the cost of future builds for the Trust and the manufacturing time for Aqueduct Marina.

The new design features an easier form of stackable craft, which reduces transportation costs and enables the boat and hopper to be manoeuvred around the canal network with ease.

The naming of the boat had been kept a secret from David, with the unveiling presentation being led by Mick Carrington, National Workboat & Plant Manager for Canal & River Trust, who was joined by David's wife Karen, work colleagues from the Trust, Stuart Norton, Marine Architect and all of the team at Aqueduct Marina.

The new workboat, along with two more under construction at the marina, will be used at various locations around the canal network to enable the Trust's colleagues to familiarise themselves with this new concept of workboat and hopper.



A Letter from Cindy in Kenya

The Refuge and Rescue Home (Familia) is situated in a very beautiful rural location called Holo overlooking Lake Victoria about a 40 minutes drive from the City



of Kisumu and founded some years ago by my sister Julie. The girls house comprises a large kitchen/diner, recreation/living room, two large dormitories

with bunk beds and shower and toilet facilities for 16 girls, ranging in age from 9yrs to 18yrs. All the girls are encouraged and responsible for helping with daily chores like cooking, cleaning and washing etc. Their school day starts very early and after a breakfast of milk tea and bread they leave the compound at 5.30 am to travel to the various schools. Their school day commences at 6am (prep) and finishes at 5pm!!



You may recall Julie raised funds two years ago to build a Nursery School on adjoining land. Last year a further three classrooms for Primary education for the local village community was constructed by a small group of English volunteers. This project is ongoing and currently there are 43 local children attending. All education has to be paid for in Kenya by parents and most want to see their children educated. The Nursery/Primary School is called Arc en ciel Academy (Rainbow) and as can be seen on the photographs all classrooms are painted in primary colours with attractive nursery themes. Smart uniforms with the school logo are worn by most pupils.



All children attending either Nursery or Primary School are provided with a nourishing lunch every day at 1pm which in most cases is possibly their only meal of the day. Their school day starts at 8am and we have recently commenced a project of providing a breakfast of porridge to each child at 10am when it is break/playtime. This porridge (unlike our oats) is made from maize and millet and is in liquid form so is nutritious and drinkable. The kids love it and of course it's feeding empty tummies, leading to more learning, in the hope of helping to get this generation out of poverty in future years. We watched the burning of old palm crosses to create ash, as performed on Ash Wednesday, 14th Feb. this year, marking the beginning of Lent which ends on Good Friday when Christ made the ultimate act of reconciliation. 

African NGO Hands at Work in Africa and is currently at the point of submitting a PhD thesis having researched cross-cultural partnerships and short-term mission visits as a way of fulfilling God's call of the whole people of God to mission. Now living in the village of Church Minshull, she spends some of her free time hedge laying, a traditional rural craft that regenerates our hedge rows, making them more hospitable to wildlife.



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Parish Council News

BOROUGH COUNCILLOR'S REPORT by Cllr Posnett. Cheshire East Council had agreed its budget for 2024/25 including cost saving proposals which included green bin charges and sale of the offices in Sandbach. There was a lengthy discussion regarding the poor state of the highways in the village. Resurfacing of Over Road was a priority in 24/25 and there would be a request to review the speed limit at the same time. With regard to the streetlight opposite Lea Green Lane, there were insufficient highways funds available therefore Cllr Posnett had request a quote to consider an alternative funding source. Councillors thanked Borough Cllr Posnett for the continued support. FLOODING AND RIVER POLLUTION It was noted that the proposal to re-stock the River Weaver with fish had been put on hold. There had been a serious incident upstream with a leak from a slurry tanker polluting the river.

ROAD ISSUES The Police and Crime Commissioner would be reminded about the potential provision of speed cameras for the village.

VILLAGE HALL REDEVELOPMENT Cllr Boote confirmed that the Funding Committee had agreed to proceed with the project and was seeking more volunteers. VILLAGE IMPROVEMENTS Cllr Lewis advised that improvements continued to be made to the website and the Parish Council pages were in the process of being updated. It was confirmed that the defibrillator was checked on a monthly basis. The Clerk has received a quote in the sum of £370 for a metal dog waste bin. The Council accepted the quote although Borough Cllr Posnett agreed to liaise with ANSA to ascertain whether a bin could be provided. CLIMATE CHANGE/BIODIVERSITY Cllr Dobson had drafted a leaflet on biodiversity which would be circulated to Councillors for consideration and would attend the forthcoming Plant Sale to promote the

FINANCE REPORT Councillors reviewed the report which identified there was £5,668 in the Council's bank accounts and the forecast outturn was £4,877. Recipe Idea for Easter



Chocolate cake for one in just a few minutes thanks to nifty use of the microwave. Add extra toppings, if you like – ice cream, strawberries, raspberries, sprinkles, chocolate flakes and wafers all work well.

Preparation time less than 30 mins Cooking time less than 10 mins Serves Makes 1 mug cake

Ingredients

- * 2 tbsp soft unsalted butter
- * 1 tbsp light brown sugar
- * 2 tbsp caster sugar
- * 4 tbsp self-raising flour
- * 1 tbsp cocoa powder
- * 1 egg yolk * ½ tsp vanilla extract
- * handful chocolate chips

Method

- 1. Put the butter into a large, microwave-safe mug. Microwave for 10–20 seconds, or until the butter has melted.
- 2. Once the butter is melted, use a fork to stir in the brown sugar, caster sugar, self-raising flour and cocoa powder. Mix until well combined without any lumps.
- 3. Add the egg yolk and the vanilla extract and stir again. Microwave for 30 seconds.
- 4. After 30 seconds, remove from the microwave, taking care to protect your hands as it could be hot. Put the chocolate chips on top of the cake mixture and use a teaspoon handle to push them down slightly into the mixture. Microwave for a further 30–40 seconds.
- 5. Carefully remove from the microwave and leave the cake to cool for 15 minutes.
- 6. Eat on its own or add a topping such as a scoop of ice cream, sprinkles, a chocolate flake or strawberries.
